



Louis Rogers, part of the writing team of the new Oxford EAP series, looks at the challenges and practicalities of teaching writing on an academic English (EAP) course. Louis will be hosting a webinar entitled 'Approaches to Teaching Academic Writing' on the 26th and 28th September.

Since the rise of the communicative approach, writing has

probably been the skill given the least time in classroom. In many general English courses writing would often simply be a simple output task in the final rubric, or consigned to further practice in a writing bank at the back of the book. Arguably, this is changing today as more and more mainstream courses are starting to acknowledge and reflect the amount of communication that occurs in written form. However, when students and teachers move into an EAP environment they notice a number of changes in the approach to writing.

One of the most obvious changes people are confronted with, when moving from general English to Academic English context, is the dominant role that writing begins to play. My own personal shift as a teacher was from Business English to Academic English and the main difference that jumped out was

A Voice for the Web World - Free!

What is Gong?

Gong is a free system for voice communication on the Web. It allows groups of people such as students and teachers to participate in discussion groups using their computers, using both synchronous (real-time) and asynchronous chat. It is commonly used by schools and universities for providing a 'voice board' for teaching purposes.

There are several different ways you can use Gong. All are free and unlimited:

Use Gong as a Standalone System

You can use the Gong system by itself. After you set up the Gong server users can use their browser or the Gong program to use the Gong system. Participants can then leave text and voice messages on voice boards. They can listen to and reply to text and voice messages left by other

people. A group of people can join a real-time text/voice chat which can be recorded on voice boards. Any messages can be quickly played back by streaming the voice from the server. In addition, there are some powerful features such as personal messaging, support for multiple languages, stuled toyt editing unice editing unice speed un/slow
